News and Reminders from Administration to Students and Parents:

- Parents and Students – Remember to bring proper **clothing for PE and outside recess** in both the elementary and high school. Boots and street shoes are not allowed on the gym floor during PE. Clothing can stay at the school on a weekly basis. After a week, they should be washed and returned. Continuing, socks, snow pants, boots, gloves, scarves, and winter coats should be worn on the bus and during recess at the elementary.
- Parents – Remember to **pay your child's lunch account** balance. If the account balance is not paid, your child will receive an alternative meal. An email/letter, text, and/or phone call is sent when lunch balances are in the negative.
- Parents – Please call before 2 PM or provide a written note for your child to have **alternate transportation arrangements**. If a written note or phone call is not received, your child will ride his/her normal bus route. Thanks for your understanding.
- Parents – If your **child(ren) will be absent** please remember to call the office and excuse them as soon as possible. When students are tardy or habitually late, we worry about the safety of your child(ren). Thanks for your cooperation with this matter.
- Parents and Students – Please, for safety reasons, **do not drive between the busses** when they are loading and unloading children at both the high school and elementary. This is when and where accidents happen. Again, do not drive between or pass busses when they are loading and unloading students.
- Parents and Students – The **end of quarter two and semester one** is January 8. Work with teachers on grades and make sure you turn assignments in on time. All online classes must be complete before the end of the quarter.
- Faculty, Staff, Students, and Parents – **Dual credit and financial aid informational meetings** for parents and students has been scheduled for Wednesday, January 16. Dual credit information will be presented from 3:30 to 4:30 PM with financial aid information from 4:30 to 5:30 PM in the high school home economics room. All students grades 9-12 are invited to attend. Financial aid information will be directed mostly to juniors and seniors, whereas, dual credit information will be directed to everyone. Sophomores, juniors, and seniors are able to enroll in dual credit classes, if or when it fits into their schedule after meeting the graduation requirements set forth by the McClusky School Board. Please attend if you have any questions.
- Faculty, Staff, Students, and Parents – There is **no school for students** January 21. Faculty and staff will be engaged in professional development January 21 from 8:30 AM to 3:30 PM.
- Staff, Students, Parents, and Community – An update to the Student Parent Handbook (page 70) was discussed and approved at the school board meeting Wednesday, December 13. The following Noon Hour Rules - Open Campus will read: "Upon returning from lunch, the high school students are to remain in the high school commons/locker area. If students bring their lunch from an establishment back to school, they are required to stay in the commons/locker area to eat and must clean up after themselves. Those students who choose to remain in the high school during noon hour/lunch are to stay in the commons/locker area. A high school staff member will be assigned by the principal to monitor the commons/locker area during the lunch period."

The McClusky FFA Chapter will travel to Bismarck the first weekend in January for the Winter Leadership Conference (WLC). TROUBLED TEEN WARNING SIGNS AND RISK FACTORS

Do you get the feeling that your teen is dealing with behavioral or emotional problems beyond the scope of what most teenagers deal with? Every teen will have struggles, but it is your job as a parent to determine if the issues your teen is facing have reached a point where intervention is necessary. Try not to compare your child to others, but rather assess based on what you know of your child. Are they acting in a way that is putting themselves and/or those around them at risk?

Extreme Moods

Teens are going to be moody. Their bodies and hormones are changing, and this is natural, but extreme fits of anger, long bouts of sadness, seeming hatred towards family members and a consistently disrespectful attitude are perhaps warning signs that something deeper is going on. Pay attention to your teen's mood swings to try to determine what some of their "triggers" are. If the extreme moods continue for months in the absence of logical triggers, it may be time to explore the possibility of a mental health disorder or more complex behavioral problem.

Unexplained Amounts of Money:

Teens living a secret lifestyle may seem to lose money or valuables very quickly, as they trade it for drugs or alcohol. As a parent or caregiver, be present in your child's life. You should always know what your teen is spending their money on. If they have a job, and never have money, there is something up!! Don't hesitate, investigate.

New Friends:

When your child enters middle school and high school they will inevitably meet new friends. This is good. But is your teen changing their behavior, appearance, or values to fit in with a new group of friends? This could be a sign of unhealthy or dangerous friendships, especially if the group your child is trying to fit in with seems to have questionable values.

Self-harm

Are there signs that your teen is cutting, burning or in any way mutilating themselves physically? If so, get help now. This is a common precursor of violent or suicidal behavior. This is not a warning sign that should be taken lightly!

Consistent Dishonesty:

Lying once to go to a party is one thing, but consistently lying about where they have been and who they have been with may be a sign that your teen is headed down a dangerous path. Clearly there is a reason they don't want you as the parent to know where they've been. When you catch them in a lie, try to get to the bottom of what they were trying to hide

No Remorse for Actions

This is a big one. All teens will make mistakes—some small, some big. But how do they react when they are caught? A teen that shows no remorse or guilt for their mistakes has crossed a dangerous line. If your teen is blatantly defying the rules you have laid out and doesn't seem to care if they get caught, these are serious warning signs. It is definitely time to seek help.

My personal advice: Make an effort to REALLY be in your child's life. Know who their friends are. Be the house they all want to hang out at. Know what music and shows they like on Netflix. (You don't have to like their music and shows, but their tastes tell us a lot about who they are.) Make time for them when it seems like you have none. (When you continually dismiss a child, they will go somewhere else for attention.) Listen to them and love them unconditionally!!
